## Executive Summary

The aim of this Deliverable is to trace the progress of the HOPE Project regarding the addition (availability, ingestion) of content, in both qualitative and quantitative terms, and to formulate a policy framework to guide the search for new collections and content providers beyond the end of the project.

The first 3 sections resume the work based on the Project's Description of Work:

- Section 1 revisits the original list of content and emphasises that, notwithstanding a few expected revisions, the project remained true to its goal in terms of the quantity and quality of content made available on Europeana and, in the near future, on the Social History Portal.
- Section 2 provides a brief overview of the challenges faced while progressing from the original lists of content made available by the different providers to the creation and management of a complex supply roadmap.
- Section 3 addresses the definition of a list of themes created to interconnect and highlight the relationships between different partners' content.

Section 4 highlights the work done to assess the final set of collections supplied, evaluating them according to chronological, geographical and thematic criteria.

Section 5 points to the road ahead by describing the efforts made to identify non-digital content in partner institutions' holdings. This will enable improved planning and management of the project in the years to come.

Section 6 takes a closer look at the future of HOPE, identifying the key materials and content to be added to the network's already vast catalogue. We also provide a summary of the tools and knowledge developed over the past three years that should make integration of new content providers not only manageable for different types of institutions, but also a valuable proposition for all stakeholders.

## Introduction

The HOPE Project essentially aims to constitute a BPN (Best Practices Network) and, at the same time, to disseminate a vast quantity of online documentation that holds great relevance for the social and political history of Europe.

This huge challenge for the project's Content Providers (CPs) led to improvements and to the re-organization of the collections, providing them with temporal, thematic and geographical tags as well as a historical and archivist treatment, compatible with Europeana and the development of the Social History Portal<sup>1</sup>[1].

Throughout this Deliverable, we analyze the stages of implementation of these purposes, the difficulties encountered and solutions designed.

As stated at the outset, we also attempt to address the definition of a Content Policy on Social History that can be traced beyond the time frame of the HOPE Project, to ensure the continued accessibility of high quality material and relevant content for research purposes.

The presented data - both quantitative and qualitative - indicate a slower execution than expected, but ultimately reach the Table 0 expectations. The pace of execution may be understood with reference to the different organizational capacities of the various CPs, and the difficulties inherent to the specificity of the documentation selected for the project.

We believe that the completed work, as well as the definition of a general framework for future development, allows us to confidently face the formal ending of the HOPE Project and its future developments.

## 1. HOPE Project – Table 0

The formulation of the HOPE Project included the preparation of a content list by each Content Provider concerning the documental fonds to be made available. With this purpose in mind, each CP selected the documentation to be incorporated into Europeana, according to their relevance to social history as historiography, while also taking the condition of its digital reproduction into account. This list (Table 0) was later supplemented by some CPs who indicated the non-digital materials whose metadata could be disclosed, reproduced in the Social History Portal – Table 1.

The intention was thus to compile and organize a wide range of archival records, library materials and visual sources as representative of *Heritage of the People's Europe*, in particular regarding the political, economic and social changes from the French Revolution until the present, and with particular emphasis on the twentieth century.

Table 0 (and also Table 1) is derived from a selection of themes and resources that does not reflect the total documental fonds held by HOPE partner institutions.

Furthermore, during the course of the HOPE Project, each institution made certain adjustments to the organization of Table 0, making it more coherent thematically, and more intuitive in chronological terms. The thematic framework on content provisions, namely the overarching social history relevance, has been adopted not only for the project's duration but also for future content submissions.

This sequence of tasks was accompanied in various institutions by preparing the digital objects - quality control of masters, creating various types of derivatives for access -, and the tasks inherent to describing items and collections.

For the duration of the HOPE Project, it was therefore possible to adjust procedures and improve the selection criteria that led to the elaboration of Table 0, which still remained the backbone of the project.

As will be shown in Section 4, the various institutions participating in the HOPE Project have reached a chronological frame of reference which, in thematic terms, is of undeniable importance to the field of Social History, whose documentation has rarely been accessible to researchers, and especially via web pages.

This Deliverable therefore analyzes this conceptualization and monitors its implementation throughout the project (Content Supply Roadmap).

We consider it important to highlight the fidelity with which the HOPE Project followed the documental fonds shown in Table 0 and, notwithstanding the necessary updates mentioned above, the original project proposal (Description of Work) has essentially been fulfilled, and even enriched by other documentary collections added as available content. However, the preliminary assessment of collections to be submitted to HOPE is slightly different from the list of submitted ones, since from the outset, the project used a well-defined concept of collections by supporting the integrity of archival units, or library serial arrangements.

## 2. From Table 0 to the Content Supply Roadmap

Throughout the project's implementation, the Content Supply Roadmap served as a useful tool to monitor the process and pitfalls in submissions, which necessitated revision of Table 0. However, the lack of common vocabularies on digital object management and differing local practices made the process quite challenging. As part of the solutions, we have introduced a common HOPE Glossary<sup>2</sup> to resolve communication problems among domain experts and ICT staff. Moreover, a general guideline was followed to prioritize the inclusion of documentation of particular iconographic interest and specific historical value on Europeana.

The tasks described above raised special difficulties in terms of coordination and implementation by the various CPs, which required successive adjustments to the methodologies adopted. Still, we believe that the HOPE Project managed to solve most of the problems of a historical, archival or technical nature, adequately providing the planned digital objects and metadata, and establishing a common HOPE best practice on the general workflow.

Given the innovative thematic character of the project (Social History), and the idiosyncratic nature of these materials mostly held in private repositories, frequent adjustments were required to the rhythm and priorities of execution; these also depended greatly on each CPs institutional context, as well as their capacity to respond in human and technical terms.

The meetings and workshops held over the course of the project established fundamental tools for the Consortium, such as the definition of the roadmap developed by each CP in close collaboration with technical support structures, for example the HOPE Aggregator.

On the other hand, the option chosen by the project concerning the existence of a SOR<sup>3</sup> (Shared Object Repository) and different LOR<sup>4</sup>s (Local Object Repositories) - which participating institutions desired - required different considerations to solve emerging problems. The performance of these two different types of repository has proved viable and been articulated smoothly, especially since the start of operations of the Social History Portal. It has also allowed for the creation of tuning procedures and thereby defined safer future paths, where technical particularities were solved on a consensual basis.

Indeed, one of the greatest virtues of the HOPE Project has been the creation of a best practice network of expertise and knowledge exchange which, crucially, is

likely to be shared in the future with the entire IALHI network. The development of this community, in which experiences are continuously exchanged, has been one of the gains of the HOPE Project. The creation and maintenance of the public WIKI<sup>5</sup> as a disseminator of Best Practices deserves special mention here.

The work concerning the HOPE Aggregator and aggregation processes is another capital issue to be emphasized, particularly in areas concerning security maintenance and development efforts.

While we have explored the opportunity to deliver data to social sites, it was concluded that in the current project, it is not feasible to mass distribute HOPE content on these sites. Our main concern was about IPR, access and expenses related to the subscription to the various APIs. However, we believe that this variable is present in all partner institutions, and that mechanisms can be developed for sharing sections of their archival fonds, in particular photographs and audiovisual material.

Since it is these characteristics, and the exchange of experiences and mutual reinforcement of knowledge, that are central objectives of the projects supported by the European Union, the Content Providers have seriously considered the maintenance and future development of the HOPE Project, the existing best practice network and HOPE services.

Defining the content policy framework is precisely one of the main tools to achieve this goal.

### 3. Defining the HOPE Themes

According to the Description of Work, the complete inventory of HOPE collections "will be clustered in meaningful sub-collections and themes, highlighting where possible cross-collection links and reconstructing the missing links between the diaspora of sources. This task will establish a common list of major themes and historical events (e.g. The Paris Commune, May 68, etc.) on the basis of which:

- The collections can be browsed thematically.
- The content supply roadmap will be produced. In this way, the phased availability of comprehensive sub-collections is ensured."

Interest in the themes among HOPE's targeted user groups was confirmed by the results of the questionnaires sent out by WP1, July-September 2010 (See Milestone M1.1, 9-6-2011).

A special workshop was organized in Paris (25 October 2010) to discuss a first draft list of themes and historical events, to determine how themes and events would be linked to HOPE descriptive metadata (related to WP2 and WP3), and to determine how themes and events would be used for searching HOPE sub-collections, especially in the Social History Portal (related to T3.7).

To determine the relevant themes and events, three strategies were discussed:

- determining the most relevant main subject areas and historical events in the field of social/labour history,
- analyzing the collections listed in Table 0, and assigning the most obvious themes (and events) to them,
- using an existing set of themes, such as the Library of Congress Subject Headings, and trying to assign these to the collections in Table 0.

The use of an existing set clearly entailed advantages yet led to very uneven results. While relevant and precise themes and events could be assigned to some collections, in very many cases, this was not possible. A combination of the first two strategies was chosen: first, the themes should represent the field of social and labour history; and second, themes present in the collections should be represented in the list. Important themes not represented by collections would become 'desiderata' for the period after the HOPE Project.

Assigning themes and events were done manually, only at the collection level, and did not result in further 'authority lists' or term normalization. Although CPs can also tag item-level and series-level records, we decided to make it mandatory only to add the themes to collections, and to link them to item and series level records. It was clear that the themes would only be used on the Social History Portal, not

on Europeana, given the fact that the Europeana data model did not support themes or events.

After the Paris meeting, an extensive report 'Specifications for common lists of major themes and historical event' was delivered by Eric Beving (UPIP). Consultation with WP2 and WP3 began on consequences for the data model and the content delivery procedures. FMS started work on more definitive lists of themes, working both from the general analysis of the domain and from the HOPE collections listed in Table 0. The proposed lists were discussed extensively during meetings in Amsterdam and Lisbon, and especially in the HOPE Project forum.

The first issue was the maximum number of themes. As the goal of the themes is the 'clustering' of collections, making relations between collections from different content providers visible to end users, it was decided to aim for a maximum number of 60 themes, and eventually even less. The final list has 48 themes<sup>6</sup>. The 'price' of this is of course that the themes themselves are broad.

The second issue was: should the list have levels, or should it be 'flat'? Themes with two or three levels can have the advantage of allowing for broadening or narrowing a search result (move to Broader Term – Narrower Term), but in the case of HOPE would create undesired complexities in the data model and subsequent functionalities within the Social History Portal, and would also probably cause long debates that are very interesting for subject cataloguers, but less relevant for end users. With a flat list, on the other hand, it can be more difficult for end users to find the term they are interested in. A compromise was reached: the themes would be presented clustered in seven main groups, each group with a 'title' and a brief description. The theme titles themselves would not function as a super-theme to search by. The seven theme clusters agreed upon are:

- **Political Parties and Movements** – covers main political tendencies and respective movements and organizations;
- **Social Issues and Movements** – includes different kinds and expressions of social movements;
- **Labour, Agriculture, Science and Economic Activities** – covers a wide range of activities and organizations, including conceptual, ideological and organizational guidelines, with a particular focus on modes of organization of labour movement;
- **Life conditions** – collects different realities of social, economic and cultural conditions as an expression of people's living;

- **War and Peace** – this group includes not only the general issues of war and peace, but also many of its consequences and implications;
- **Human Rights** – this generic term includes a wide range of backgrounds, with a large chronological spectrum, allowing multiple expressions of affirmation and defence of human rights;
- **State and International Questions** – this group includes national and international issues, whether related to state and administrative questions, or national liberation movements.

The third issue under discussion: historical events. Defining a historical event is very problematic as such, and it is most often debatable if a collection is 'about' a certain event. Finding common definitions for historical events between content partners from ten different European countries, each with its own history, proved extremely difficult, and did not promise to lead to results relevant for end users. After due deliberation, it was decided not to assign historical events to collections at all. Given the fact that collections will have spatial and temporal metadata, anyone interested in a specific event will be able to look for collections that cover the country and/or period of this event, and work from there. On the Social History Portal, a presentation can be developed where collections are displayed on a timeline which also marks important and relevant historical events. In this way, a possible relation is suggested without the need to assign historical events to collections.

During 2012, the issue of assigning themes below collection level came up again. Themes assigned to collections would not be automatically assigned to the items belonging to the collection, as the theme goes for the whole, and not necessarily for each and every individual item. But several partners felt that it would be a pity not to have the possibility to assign themes to series or item level records, in order to improve search results or to create 'virtual collections', as it were. Possibilities were investigated to add functionalities to the Aggregator infrastructure. Assigning themes below collection level according to 'propagation rules' (the option to propagate terms from a parent to all child records or from any child to its parent records) proved too complex, but assigning themes to record sets from a search result or even to individual items proved feasible. CNR-ISTI team was able to develop a 'Tagging Tool' which gives Content Providers the possibility to add themes to series or items within their own collections.

## 4. Final Table 0 – Time, Space and Themes

The HOPE Project aims to make a group of different documents accessible, drawing a broad picture of a time of accelerated political, economical, social, scientific and technological transformations.

With that purpose in mind, the HOPE Project Content Providers selected (both quantitatively and qualitatively) documental collections which fulfill that objective as expressed in Table 0. As already mentioned, some CPs completed that work with more information about non-digital collections (Table 1) also available at their institutions.

Finally, and over the project's time span, it was possible to attract new CPs with new content, enlarging the scope of the historical and iconographic information delivered to the public, mainly through Europeana and the Social History Portal.

This information and documentation, gathered in a digital form, and accompanied by advanced instruments of contextualization and access, must be considered as an important source of Social and Labour History cross-referencing, especially in the European context, allowing both researchers and the general public the possibility to search and cross-check different collections, archival sources and tools.

We agreed that this content should be seen in three fundamental perspectives:

- a) **time**
- b) **space**
- c) **historical relevance (themes)**

- 1) regarding '**time**', we want to represent the temporal range of the delivered content, making it clearly visible and highlighting important periods with their most representative documents.
- 2) in the '**space**' aspect, we refer to the geographical incidence of the documents, representing the extent and diversity of available collections. It is important to note that this attribute is not always clearly expressed in the CPs' metadata, and also that the scope of much documentation is greater than just one country or region.
- 3) in what refers to the '**historical relevance**', we want to make available both a characterization and qualification about the displayed collections, particularly through analysis of the tagging of the proposed Themes.

As a Best Practice Network (BPN), the HOPE Content Policy Framework intends to establish a chronological, geographical and thematic Framework of the supplied collections that portrays their complex reality, helping to determine possible gaps in their coverage, while at the same time hoping to establish the possibility of larger projects on the treatment of other Social and Labour History sources.

Information was collected from 13 providers, corresponding to **3.816,690** digital objects (corresponding to **957,544** records), covering a time period from 1787 to 2013.

It is possible now to provide a frame of reference for that documentation, an updated Table 0<sup>7</sup>, concerning the TIME period, SPACE and THEMES.

### a. TIME Collections by Provider

The information collected about TIME included the 'starting date' and the 'ending date' of the production of the collections, following archivist and historical criteria. Of course it is also relevant to know the time/event covered by the document: for this purpose it was recommended that this be referred to in the Historical relevance (e.g. a document produced in 1789 about the French Revolution must be identified with the date 1789, and tagged with the appropriate theme(s)).

These summarized portraits of the documents delivered by each provider show a global consistency (in terms of TIME incidence) as illustrated in the graphic below:

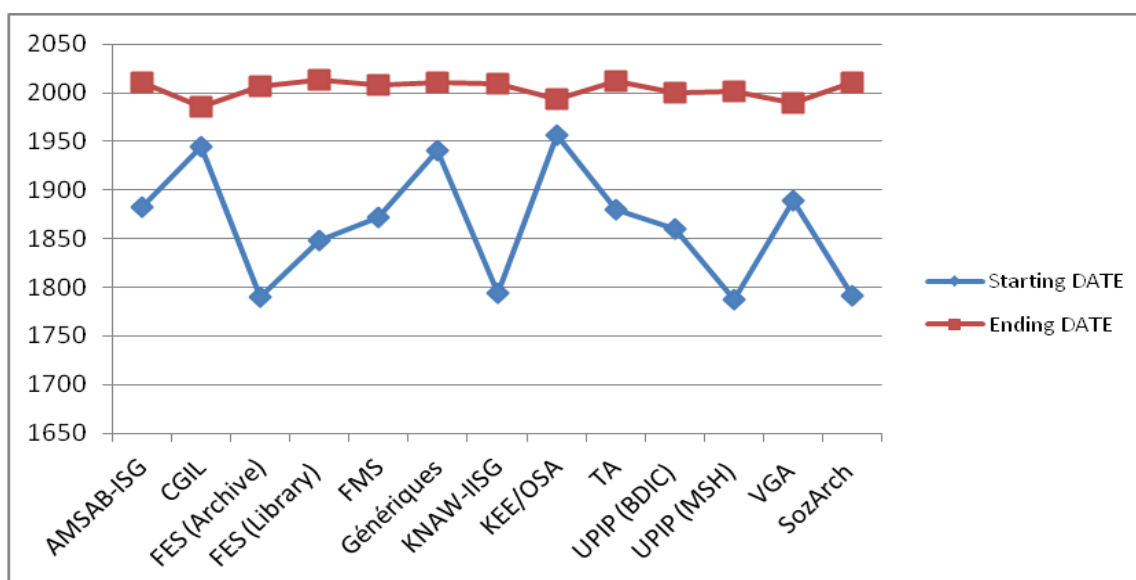


Figure 1 – All Content Providers

As shown, most of the collections are related to the twentieth century, though with significant inroads in the nineteenth century (corresponding to the growth of labour movements), and even in the final years of the eighteenth century.

A time frame overview of the collections of each provider is in the figures below<sup>8</sup>.

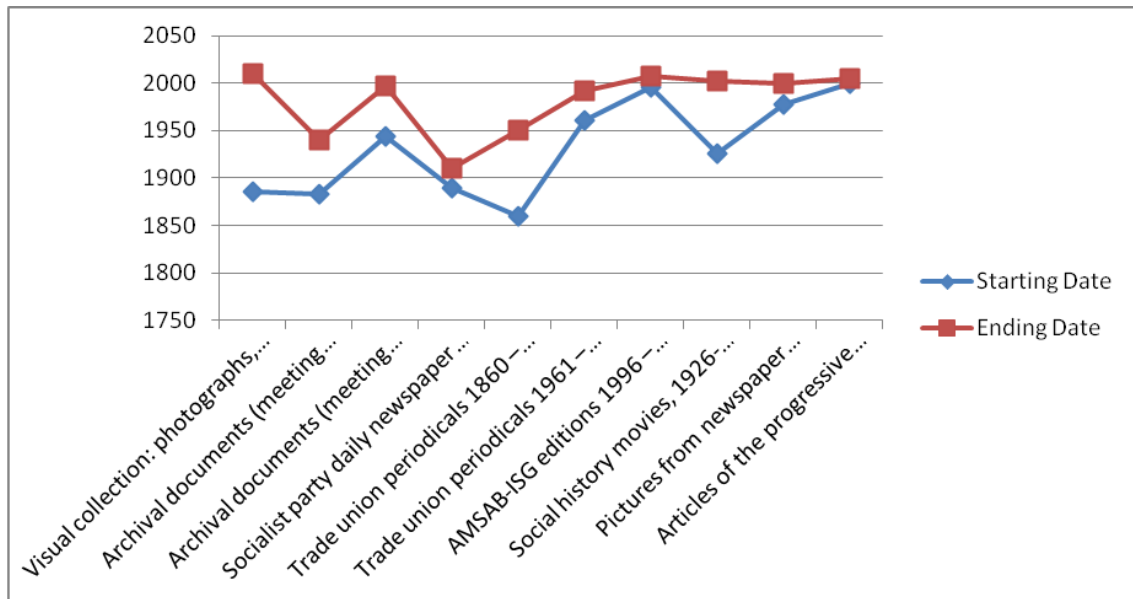


Figure 2 – AMSAB-ISG (Amsab-Institute of Social History)

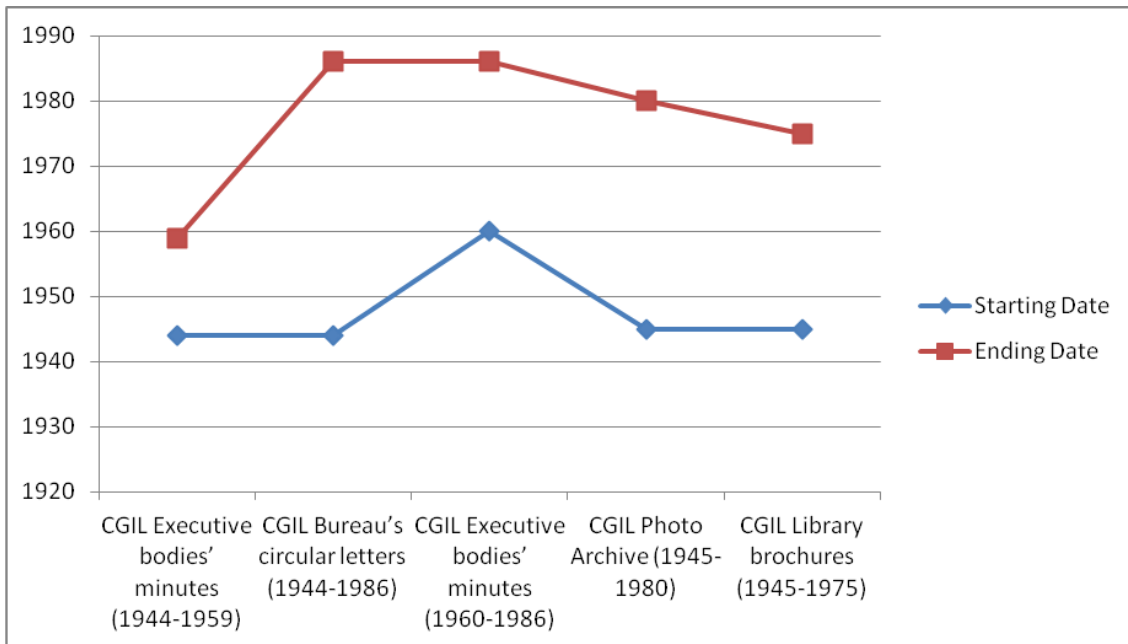


Figure 3 – CGIL (Confederazione Generale Italiana del Lavoro)

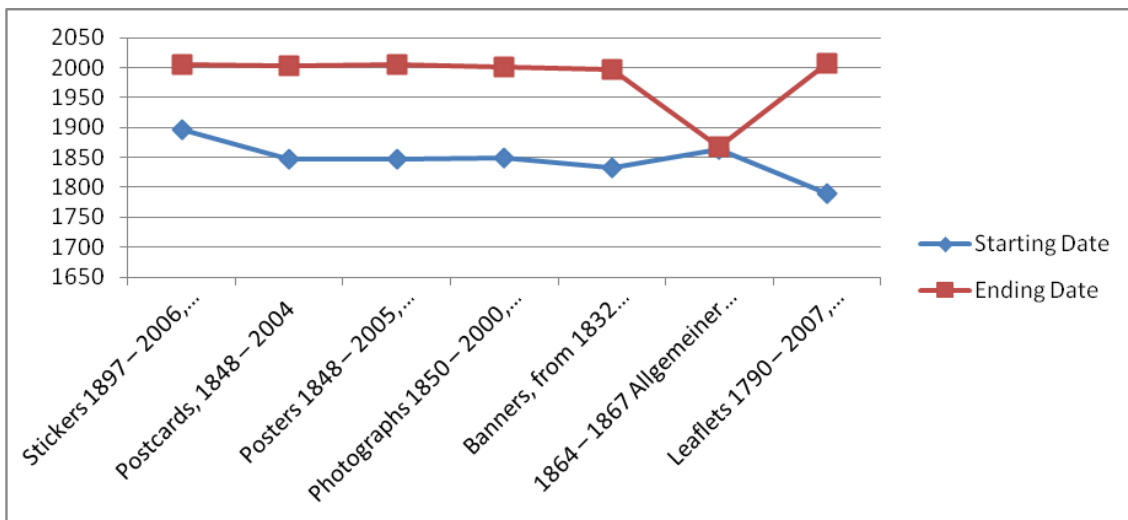


Figure 4 – FES Archive (Friedrich-Ebert-Stiftung - Archiv der sozialen Demokratie)



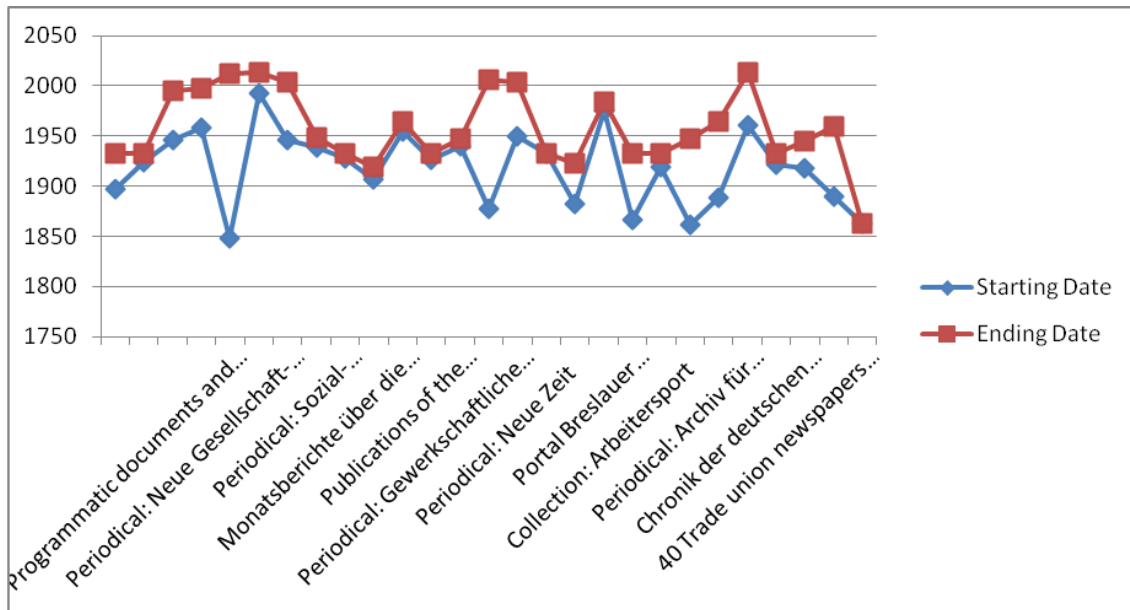


Figure 5 – FES Library (Friedrich-Ebert-Stiftung - Bibliothek der sozialen Demokratie)

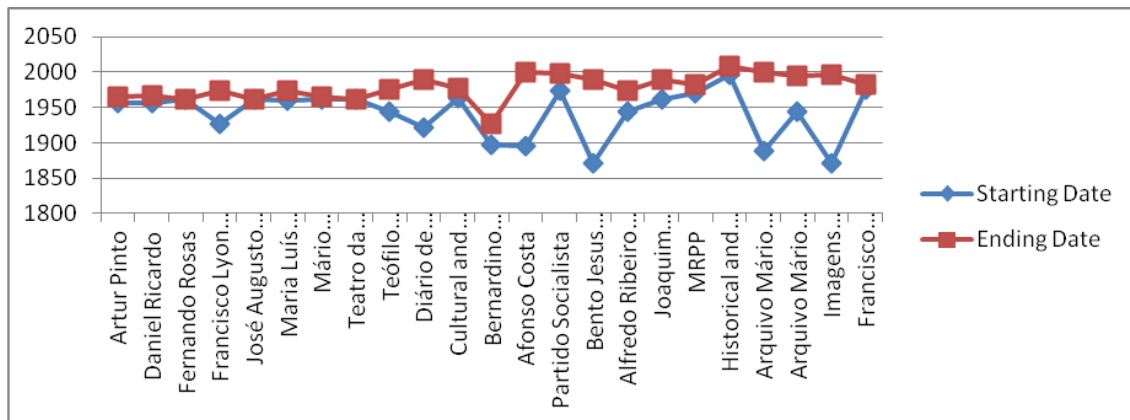


Figure 6 – FMS (Fundação Mário Soares - Arquivo & Biblioteca)

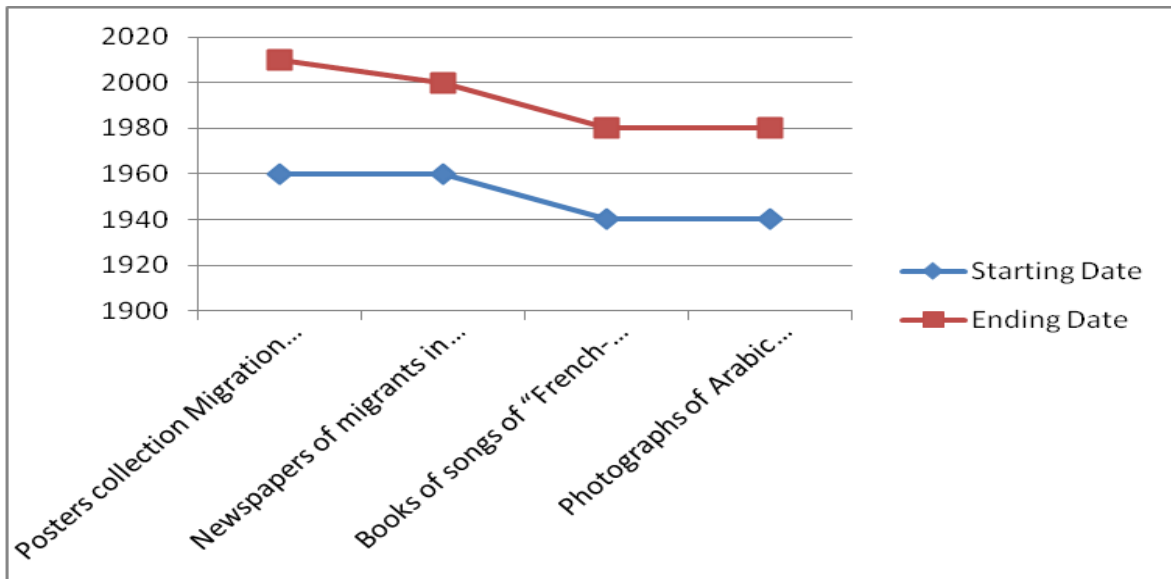


Figure 7 – Génériques

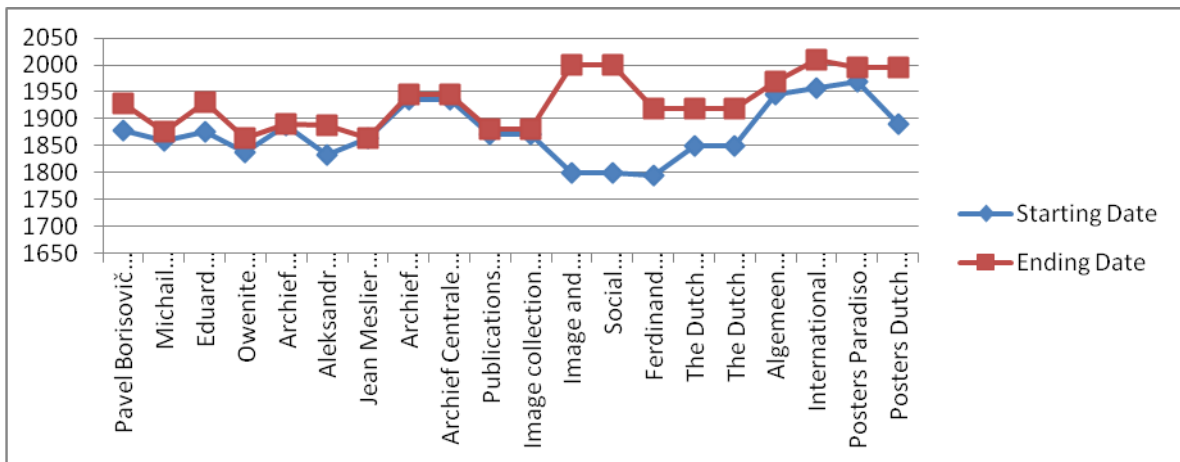


Figure 8 – KNAW-IISG (The International Institute of Social History)

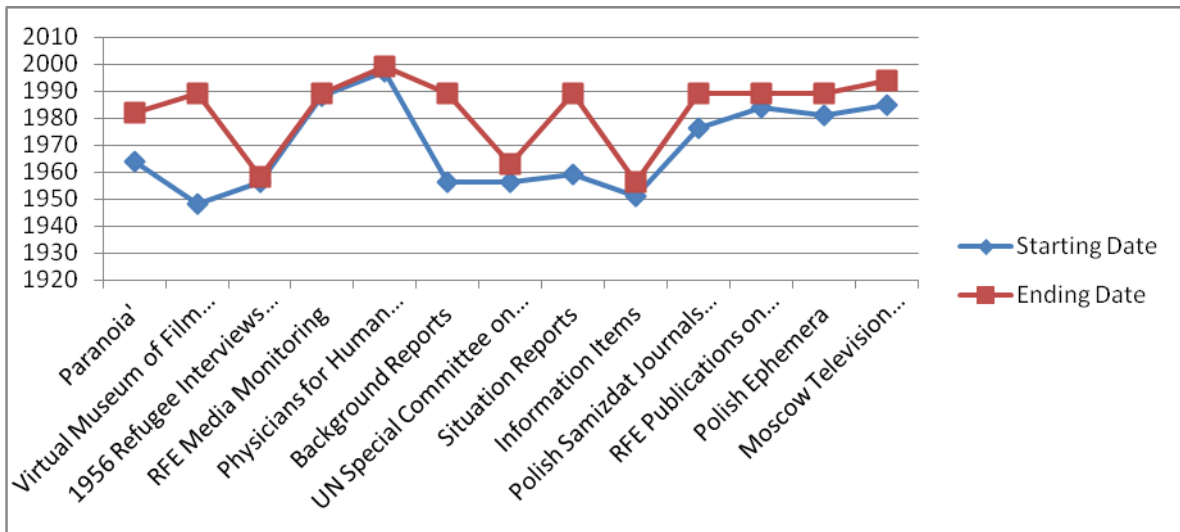


Figure 9 – KEE/OSA (Nyílt Társadalom Archívum / Közép Európai Egyetem – Open Society Archives at Central European University)

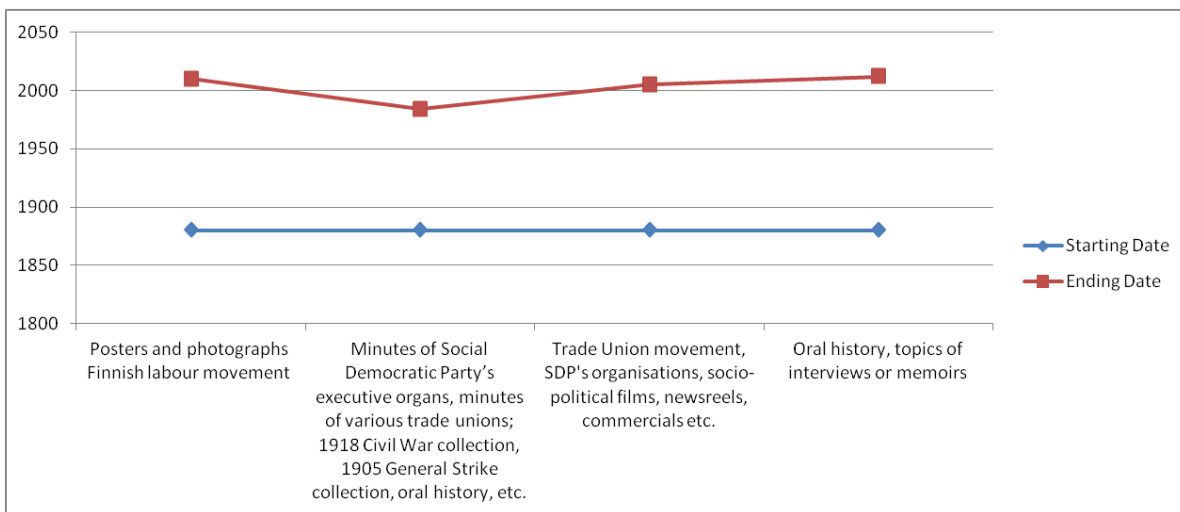


Figure 10 – TA (Työväen Arkisto)

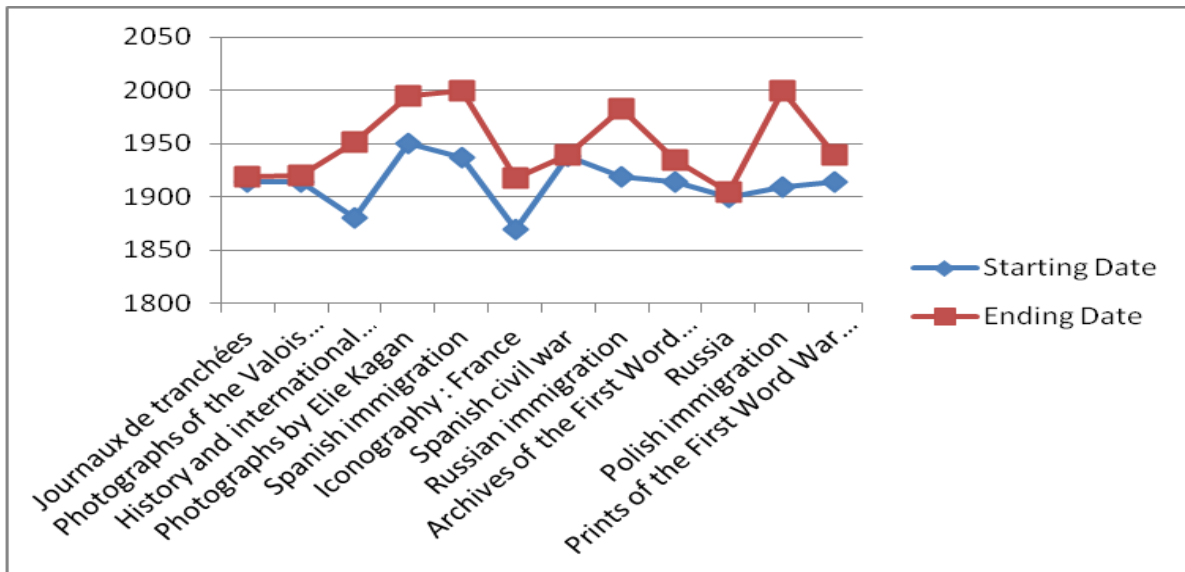


Figure 11 – UPIP-BDIC (Centre d’ Histoire Sociale du XXe siècle – Université Paris1-Sorbonne/Centre National de la Recherche Scientifique - Bibliothèque de Documentation Internationale Contemporaine)

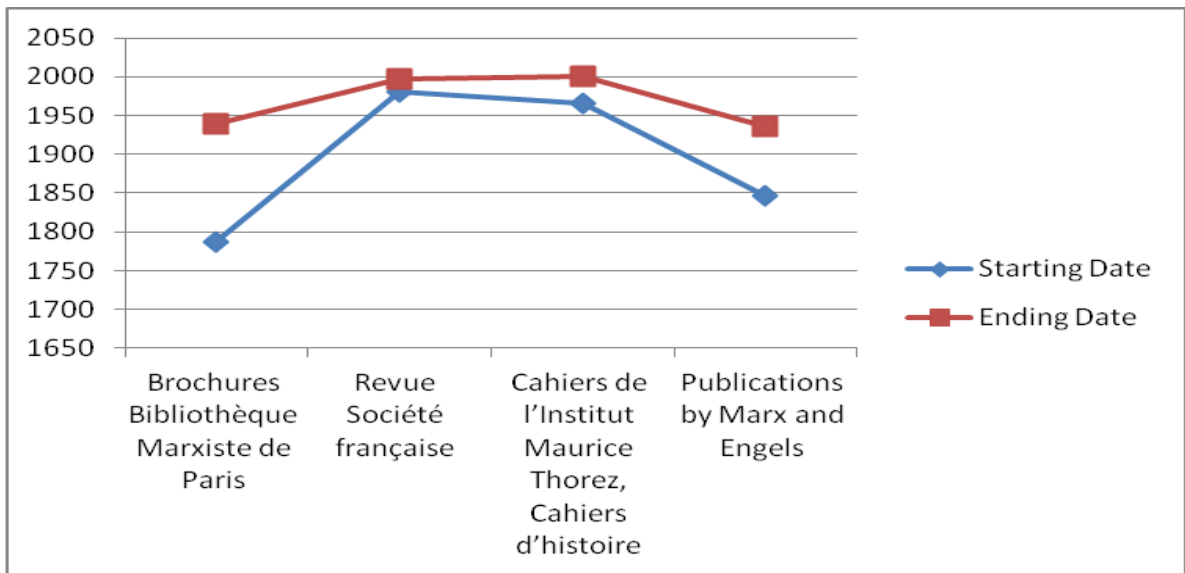


Figure 12 – UPIP-MSH (Centre d’ Histoire Sociale du XXe siècle – Université Paris1-Sorbonne/Centre National de la Recherche Scientifique / Fondation Maison des Sciences de l’Homme)

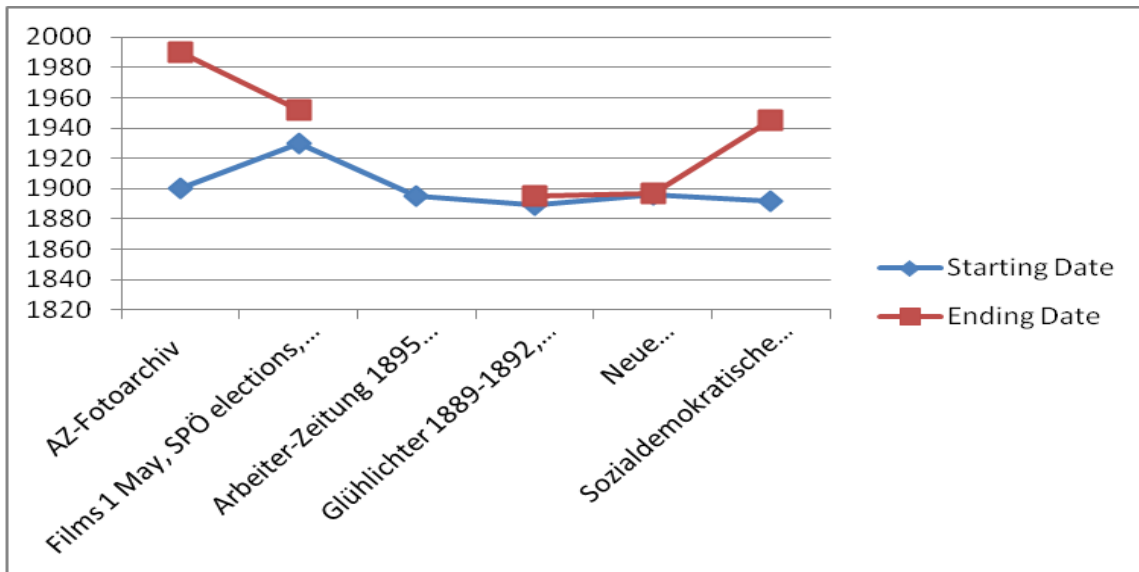


Figure 13 – VGA (Verein für Geschichte der Arbeiterbewegung)

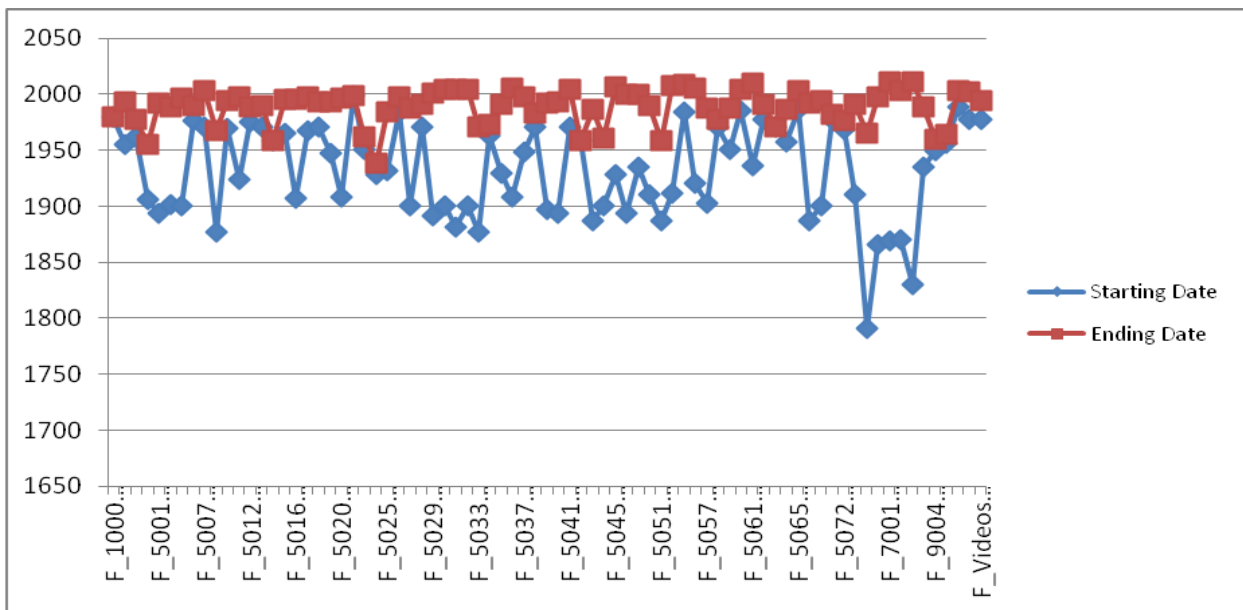


Figure 14 – SozArch (Schweizerisches Sozialarchiv)

The documentation provided by the HOPE Project presents a huge area of geographical focus, given that many documents exceed the scope of one country, and reflect the transnational / international organizations and activities of the people who produced them.

It should also be noted that a significant number of documents (e.g., referring to anti-colonial movements) also cover a dozen African countries.

### **c. THEMES – graphic of the general incidence of subjects**

Concerning the collections' Historical Relevance, CPs were asked to select a maximum of 3 Themes from the historical themes list (see: section 3. Defining the HOPE Themes).

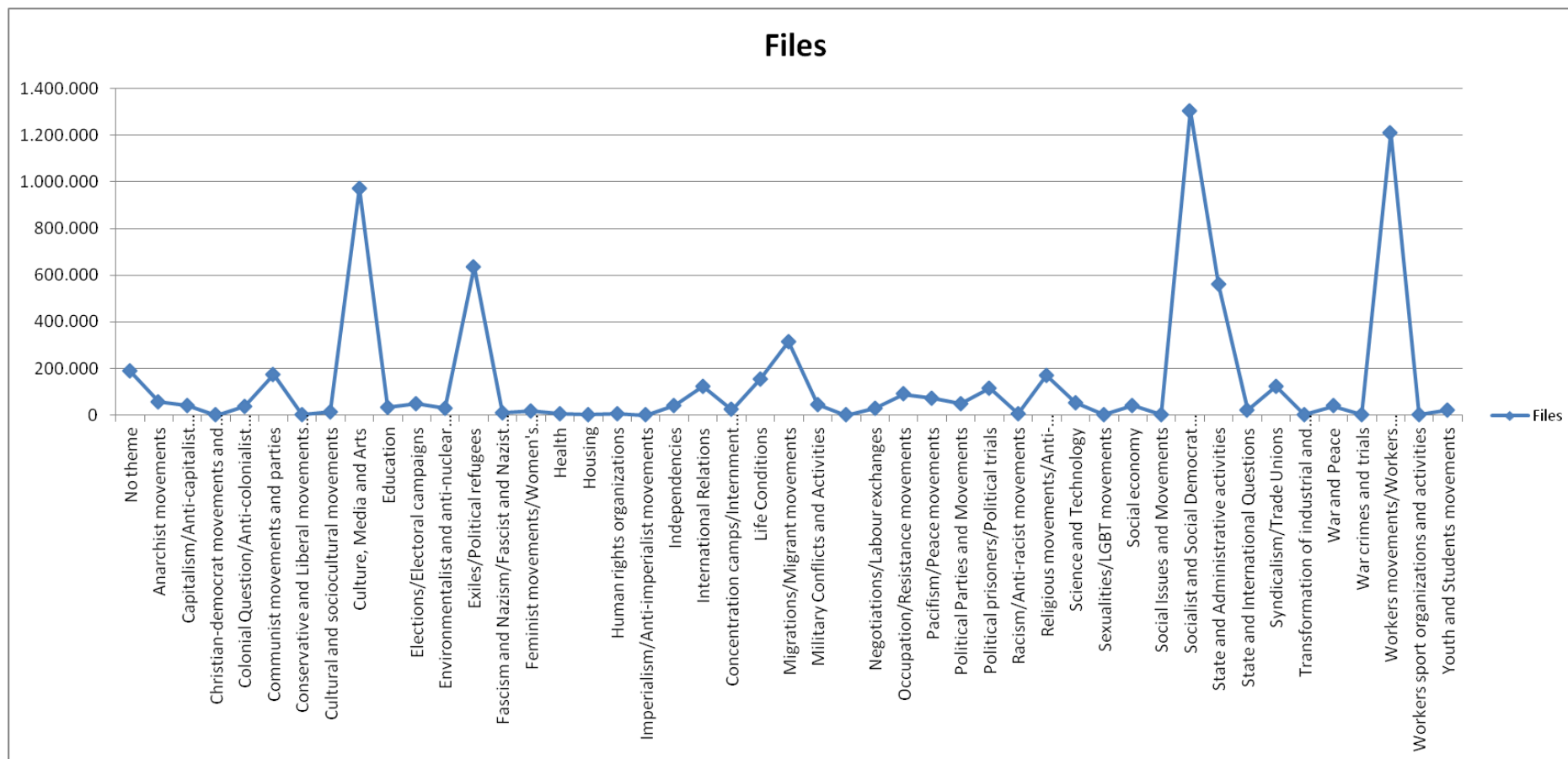


Figure 15 – THEMES represented in HOPE collections (by number of files)

As illustrated in Figure 15 (page 27) five Themes predominate, together representing over 50% of the total files: Socialist and Social Democrat parties/Socialist International (1.303.284); Workers movements/Workers councils/Workers International organizations (1.211.379); Culture, Media and Arts (972.584); Exiles/Political refugees (637.367); State and Administrative activities (559.628).

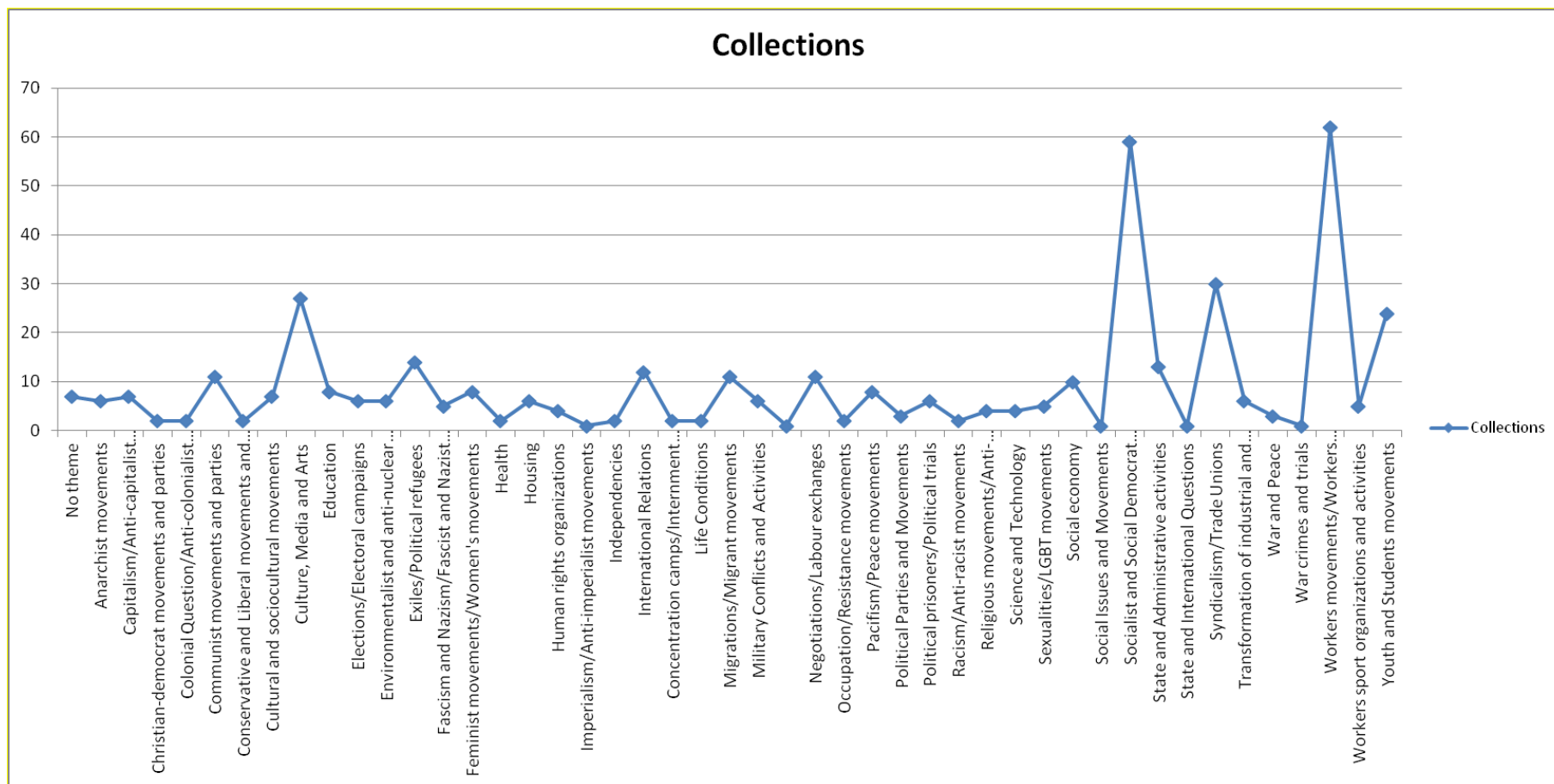


Figure 16 – THEMES represented in HOPE collections (by number of collections)

As illustrated in Figure 16 (page 28), the major Themes present in the HOPE collections include: Workers movements/Workers councils/Workers International

organizations (62); Socialist and Social Democrat parties/Socialist International (59); Syndicalism/Trade Unions (30); Culture, Media and Arts (27); Youth and Students movements (24).

These figures allow us to check the incidence of subjects (Themes) in terms of the quantity of files and collections; differences between the figures produce a quantitative and a qualitative overview<sup>9</sup>.

The construction of the Tagging Tool with controlled language (Themes previously defined) will allow for the collections and documents to be presented more meaningfully in the Social History Portal (IALHI).

## 5. Table 1 – the non-digital subset

Table 0 and Table 1 are complementary overviews of HOPE partner institutions' collections. The former contains metadata on digitised materials to be uploaded to Europeana and the Social History Portal. The latter contains metadata on materials that have not yet been digitised, and which will only be made available through the Social History Portal.

Although Table 0 is a cornerstone of the HOPE Project, it only provides a glimpse of what lies within partner institutions' vaults, and should not be regarded a comprehensive overview or relevant sample of the total collections. It contains only what is digitised and available online which is, of course, a limited amount of data. There are numerous reasons why large parts of the collection eligible for digitisation remain undigitised or, if they are digitised, why they are not available online: shortage of funds and resources, copyright issues, prioritizing more fragile or popular collections, and so on.

Table 1 aims to resolve this. It contains metadata records from a much broader selection of collections which are not digitised themselves. As such, it provides a much better overview of the HOPE partner institutions' holdings, and the combined sets provide researchers with a much clearer picture of the resources available on the social history of the people's Europe, as well as of the Themes addressed within the HOPE field. It should be noted that the list provided in Appendix 3 is not the final one: some CPs are still defining their internal policies to provide this information and one result of that are recent withdrawals while otherwise additions can be expected, especially by new content partners.

Table 1, however, goes further than this, for four main reasons:

- It serves to contextualize Table 0 in terms of how HOPE collections fit into local repositories' holdings, what other themes could be added in future, and what further collections are to be digitized following the HOPE Themes.
- Closely related to the previous reason, Table 1 aims to identify the gaps in the digitized collections, and to reveal blind spots in the thematic framework that still need to be addressed.
- Table 1 may also serve as a planning tool for future digitization, and reveal future priorities.
- Lastly, Table 1 emphasizes the connections between the collections held by current HOPE partners and future contributors to the Social History Portal, and shows the extent to which these collections, and thus the lives of people in Europe, are intertwined through several important themes and events.

On the whole, Table 1<sup>10</sup> should enlarge the world of the HOPE collections, and show that the HOPE Project is not yet complete. It is a work-in-progress, and Table 1 is a means to encourage organisations to make further additions to Europeana and the Social History Portal. (Table 1 may also record potential future content submissions, or amendments to existing HOPE collections by presenting non-digital, but thematically related materials.)

## 6. Content Policy Framework

### 6.1. Background

The HOPE Content Policy Framework provides guidelines on the provision of digital objects and descriptive metadata to the HOPE federated repositories. It aims at defining a solid and comprehensive list of criteria which could guide content provision workflows from the HOPE federated repositories<sup>11</sup> to the Social History Portal, Europeana and social platforms during and after the HOPE Project. Bearing in mind the thematic approach of the HOPE Project, and in establishing a common understanding of Social History collections, we need to delineate a few common denominators of such sources held in local repositories. Having done this, the Content Policy Framework strives to identify a method of assessment for selecting digital collections for the HOPE BPN, and to ensure continuity for the post-HOPE period by formulating such provisions.

The Content Policy Framework is part of this general policy infrastructure ensuring the common appraisal of highly scattered, ephemeral and idiosyncratic collections: non-digital, digitized or born-digital.

### 6.2. What is a Social History collection regardless of being or not being digital?

HOPE CPs and future IALHI Content Providers collect a wide range of records. However, the concept of Social History is itself open to interpretation, and is often defined by its focus on social structures, and processes beyond national constraints. It is thought to be concerned with "real life" rather than abstract theories, with "ordinary people" rather than privileged elites, with "everyday things" rather than political events. These holdings are different from the public records usually found in traditional state archives, in that they fill a gap in terms of social memory, and represent views, perceptions and experiences less frequently captured in the holdings of national state archives, or in dedicated audiovisual and broadcast archives with more defined acquisition policies. Social History institutions and HOPE CPs have their own content policies broadly delineating the types of materials they accept, although these policies are less selective about quality. As they are partly or entirely private institutions and often solicit overlooked, endangered, "uncollectable" content, they tend to draw a large proportion of ephemera, grey literature, informal works, artifacts and perishable material. For this reason the genre and the format of these materials is rather

heterogeneous while the topical scope, keeping their profile distinct from that of state institutions, is quite restrictive.

### **6.3 What is a collection<sup>12</sup> in HOPE?**

The purpose of these guidelines is to support the formation of digital data sets - collections - despite thematic considerations by convention, and to enable delivery services for the distribution of metadata about HOPE holdings with contextual bibliographic information. It is strongly recommended that the collection concept is applied by all HOPE CPs, and metadata provided to the HOPE Aggregator services is only accepted if the collection is well defined for digital and non-digital collections too.

Non-digital means submitting only bibliographic/finding aid descriptions about a unit: document or set of documents regardless of their format. For example, in the case of archival descriptions, the smallest unit of the description could be the archival item-level record or a folder containing a group of records collected with a similar function, while in the library domain the item could be identified as an issue of a publication or a publication title referring to several issues.

The HOPE collections are logical intellectual entities to offer high-level entry points to users browsing and searching the community site (Social History Portal). Through clustering item descriptions users interested in Social History are given meaningful contextual information about the purpose, origin and provenance of these records. By enriching their exploratory experience they do not necessarily need to consult finding aids and catalogs on the local institutional sites to understand the scope of digital objects or descriptions online.

Collections descriptions in HOPE are also useful tools to generate a general and comparable overview of all social history collections in HOPE, and by offering standard collection descriptions to external data delivery services they could be easily harvested, reused or visualized. Content Providers should tag their HOPE collections and respective items with HOPE Themes<sup>13</sup> in order to bring the HOPE Social History domain together as a coherent body of material, regardless of local classification structure and language. HOPE Themes will cluster the HOPE Social History content in Europeana, highlighting the domain and enhancing the discovery-to-delivery<sup>14</sup> experience.

- Collection definitions and collection level metadata is mandatory to enable collection-level browsing (in the Social History Portal<sup>15</sup>)
- HOPE Themes and other metadata (such as time span and geographical coverage) are also assigned on the collection level
- There are various approaches which could lead to a collection: provenance (originator, archive creator, donor, author of materials, data provider, either individual or corporate body), pertinence (subject or theme based), material type (periodicals, moving images, brochures, visual objects)
- Large, broad collections are best broken up into smaller and more coherent sub-collections
- The submission of data to the HOPE Aggregator<sup>16</sup> should basically happen on the collection level
- The mapping<sup>17</sup> of data to the Aggregator is defined per collection
- It is possible to assign HOPE Themes to subsets or groups of items (even belonging to different source collections) using the HOPE Tagging Tool, but this action will never create new collections in the HOPE content space.
- Based on domain-specific characteristics of a collection, each CP should decide which domain profile is most appropriate: Library, Archival, and Audiovisual Visual and Dublin Core Profile<sup>18</sup>
- The itemization of metadata description is a crucial requirement for all objects –digital or non digital – coherently belonging to a HOPE collection and supported by the HOPE Common Data Model<sup>19</sup>.

## 6.4. Guidelines for new collections/CPs

Concerning the Content Policy for defining incoming collections and the inclusion of new CPs, the HOPE Project defines the criteria for the desired enlargement:

- Historical sources with relevant subjects of non-state organizations, individuals who have played a specific role in social movements;
- Audiovisual materials, broadcast media, home movies, photo collections, oral histories, narrative interviews documenting traumatic or other historical events
- Mixed media collections crossing traditional information domains (library, archives, museums)
- Mixed language collections, no limitations on geographical origin or country coverage, although materials from Spain, Ireland, the United Kingdom, Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Greece, the Balkans and the former state Socialist countries are highly desired.
- Ephemeral collections, grey literature, underground publications
- Endangered records: current political or advocacy relevance, addressing post-colonial status, ex-colonies and anti-colonial movements so called "rare collections"
- Time span: starting before 1789 to the present
- Non-restricted materials containing no sensitive data or personal information

Finally, we emphasise the importance of making further documentation available on two major political and military conflicts of the first half of the twentieth century in Europe: the First World War and the Spanish Civil War. With these Content Policy Guidelines, the community repository established by HOPE will develop and expand coherently.

## 6.5. IPR conditions for collections to be integrated in HOPE

The HOPE Community assumes that Content Providers take full responsibility for clearing copyrights on their metadata and digital objects that they offer to the federated service. On the other hand and by default, collection descriptions and catalog/finding aid metadata offered to HOPE should be licensed under Creative Commons CC0 1.0 Universal (CC0 1.0) waiving all rights under copyright law including all related and neighboring rights, to the extent allowed by law. The Public Domain Dedication of HOPE metadata means that it could be copied, modified, distributed even for commercial purpose without asking permission of the data provider. Rights on digital objects do not fall into the public domain category, but HOPE requires that all Content Providers should explicitly state the license under which they are providing content. In order to achieve this scope

HOPE IPR Best Practice Guidelines<sup>20</sup> offers a rather comprehensive, though not exhaustive, guidelines on procedures to identify public domain materials, or the appropriate licensing of digital collections for online use. The HOPE Content Policy Framework also requires the assignment of standard use rights metadata on each digital object submitted to Europeana. The Europeana Rights Statements<sup>21</sup> complement the Creative Commons ones, and all statements declare that the objects are subject to rights, which may be held by the Content Provider or third parties. These statements ensure that rights are reserved by the Content Provider, and also inform users about levels of access to a specific resource. At the same time HOPE collections could be also deposited with the Shared Object Repository (SOR)<sup>22</sup> and not made available for public access. The SOR serves as a safe and secure object repository for storing digital masters in order to share storage costs and to set up a preservation suite for SOR users.

## Conclusions

During the HOPE Project the different CPs have, in essence, carried out the work defined in Table 0 included in the Description of Work.

Throughout the project, tools were developed for describing the collections made available by the different CPs.

The application of these instruments to the collections disseminated through Europeana (and the Social History Portal) added value to the documentation and, in particular, aimed at improving researchers' access to information. It was even possible to develop technical solutions to accommodate these parameters, namely in the HOPE Aggregator.

As the HOPE Project is reaching its end, we emphasize the relevance of the content supplied (made available), which shows a remarkable coherence and consistency in terms of Time, Space and Themes. Although the content provided is undeniably comprehensive, covering a broad spectrum of Social and Political Europe, there remain some thematic, temporal and spatial gaps. The guidelines defined in this document aim to overcome those gaps in the future.

The development of Table 1, its prioritization of work on the documentation, and the creation of relationships with new Content Providers, aim to extend the content to be made available in the future.

The HOPE Project has also allowed each CP to improve on their own internal procedures and enrich the metadata on their archives. HOPE partners appreciate this with great interest, and consider the maintenance of this network especially relevant.

The establishment of a public WIKI incorporates precisely the fundamental aspects of the solutions developed and contains guidelines for future work, with special attention to the specificity of the documents on Social History.

Accordingly, this Deliverable analyzes the progress of the project in terms of Content Policy and the various tasks developed and implemented, the tools developed and the design of future steps.

The specificity of the content incorporated in this project raised intense discussions that helped to establish the consensus necessary for the proper consistency of the whole work. It is also important to state that releasing this historical documentation through Europeana and the Social History Portal required specific solutions for each of these resources to be better focussed on their target users.

Finally, the establishment of future goals and procedures is undoubtedly a decisive step toward the development and maintenance of a network, incorporating both the know-how acquired, and strengthening the community of archives brought about by this project.
