1 Introduction

The Partage Plus WP3 – Metadata Enrichment aims at creating a basic resource of terminology for the indexing of Art Nouveau specific object descriptions. The harmonization of metadata gathered from more than 110 European collections¹ providing content is the prerequisite for enabling the Partage Plus contribution of almost 75.000 items related to Art Nouveau within Europeana by end of February, 2014. Heterogeneous metadata from various collections, for being presented together in an online publishing context with such a broad scope like Europeana, need to be aligned for the purpose of searching them together. The difficulty of tracing works of art with regard to certain aesthetic concepts within online databases can be demonstrated by a simple search for Art Nouveau content within Europeana. Searching with “Art Nouveau”² results in 3.272 items, searching with “Jugendstil”³ results in 766 items. However, the share of objects related to Art Nouveau within the over 26

million of items in Europeana is much bigger than these results suggest. Due to the lack of consistent labelling in order to identify affiliations most of these items are not accessible as being Art Nouveau related, except for being searched by an artist’s name. The share of Art Nouveau content that can be traced within Europeana is considerably increasing by number and quality of metadata through the contribution of the Partage Plus project.

2 Partage Plus metadata enrichment with specialist Art Nouveau Terms

The Specialist Art Nouveau Terms ‘Micro’ Vocabulary (DoW task 3.3) is the second component of the Deliverables of WP3 created for the enrichment of partners’ metadata with controlled vocabulary. With regard to the Partage Plus target of enabling Art Nouveau in Europeana metadata needs to indicate an object’s relation to Art Nouveau and/or to a specific variation of Art Nouveau.

The Partage Plus vocabulary of D3.2 provides terms for the indexing of Art Nouveau objects with regard to style specification. The vocabulary shall facilitate the retrieval of all project partners’ content within Europeana and includes national and regional specifications of the aesthetic expression. Such specifications were verified or initially provided by the respective partners, including scope notes for these concepts.

According to the DoW the target number of concepts within the Specialist Art Nouveau Micro Vocabulary was 50 to a maximum of 100 concepts in order to make sure that the vocabulary will encompass a great many of objects and metadata enrichment will at the same time be an achievable goal for all partners. Interoperability and usefulness to Europeana will be achieved by providing terms identifying the Art Nouveau aspects of an object, covering all the languages (16) of the content providers of the project: Catalan, Croatian, Czech, Dutch, English, Finnish, French, German, Hungarian, Italian, Norwegian; Polish; Portuguese; Slovenian; Spanish and Swedish. The enrichment of the metadata delivered to Europeana with these terms is mandatory for all partners.

The vocabulary is open for free reuse, all components are being made available on the Partage Plus Website⁴.

2.1 Preconditions for the retrieval of Art Nouveau related works of art

Agreeing on appropriate information categories for object descriptions of Partage Plus partners’ content and common standards for delivering this information to Europeana is a precondition for the comprehensive integration of metadata from different sources being joined for federated search within internet portals, such as Europeana. To achieve this goal all

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partners are working with the same core cataloguing elements and use the same controlled terminologies for the respective information categories.

The project gathers Art Nouveau content from more than 110 European museums and archives through participation of 25 project partners from 17 European nations. Some partners are cooperating with further national collections, like ICCU (3 associated providers), UNIMAR (5 associated providers) and MUO (80 associated providers). The definition of core cataloguing fields and their delivery in a standard metadata format (LIDO) has been agreed as an basic intermediate element in collaboration of NTUA and UNIMAR linking WP 2 and 3 within the first months of the project, and is available since July 2012. The controlled vocabulary relates to this metadata structure, providing integrated components to cover the spectrum of the project partners’ content as comprehensive as possible. The D3.2 SPECIALIST ART NOUVEAU TERMS ‘MICRO’ VOCABULARY concerning the styles classification refers to the LIDO element lido:classification@lido:type="style".

Metadata gathered in online portals does not necessarily include style specific information. Produced in collections’ management processes primarily for internal use, metadata may be informative within the respective collection’s context bearing considerable depth of information details. Often collections’ management metadata does not list any information on style aspects. Art historians prefer to avoid style categorization, being aware that rough style characterization in many cases fails to meet scientific requirements. However, for the general public style classifications are a popular search category, especially in an online environment with such a broad scope as Europeana where all kinds of objects from all periods of art production are available. Therefore introducing a specific style category into the metadata is a means of facilitating access to the content from a specific period of art production, as it is the scope of the Partage Plus project.

According to the project objective of enabling Art Nouveau content in Europeana flagging all metadata with the concept “Art Nouveau” is a basic means of characterizing the aesthetic context of the objects. This reference provides at least a general affiliation in order to filter works of art according to a rough style category.

2.2 Relation to other Partage Plus vocabulary components

With regard to fostering retrieval functionality of the Partage Plus content within Europeana the Partage Plus vocabularies provides components for the alignment of concepts used for the object descriptions and an authority file for the identification of persons, manufactories, and groups of agents related to Art Nouveau. The Deliverables D3.1 (‘Micro’ Object Type) and D3.2 SPECIALIST ART NOUVEAU TERMS ‘MICRO’ VOCABULARY (D3.2) are being complemented by additional vocabulary components for the refined indexing of the object

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type, techniques, materials, and roles of actors. The additional components are brought together based upon the Partage Plus partners’ ambition and readiness for extra effort with regard to optimize the quality of metadata. Deliverable D3.3 will provide the Partage Plus Authority file of Art Nouveau Creators, e.g. artists and producers related to Art Nouveau which will internally be connected to the D3.2 styles vocabulary by referencing the identifiers of the Art Nouveau style a creator is affiliated with.

The first component of the Partage Plus vocabulary, the Deliverable D3.1 ‘Micro’ Object Type Terminology, containing 49 concepts for a more general object type classification, has been provided in December 2012 and is available on the project website for free reuse. The Deliverable D3.2 provides concepts for specifying different flavours of Art Nouveau in order to subclassify the wide range of Art Nouveau objects into their national, regional or other specific variations.

2.3 Approach

Initial input for the creation of the Partage Plus Specialist Art Nouveau terminology was given by all partners at the Kick-off Meeting in Budapest in March 2012 (M01).

As all Partage Plus vocabularies have been related from the outset to the Getty Art & Architecture Thesaurus (AAT), being the most differentiated and most widely used thesaurus for artworks in the scope of the Partage Plus project, the AAT “Styles and Periods Facet”⁵ has been the starting point for the work on D3.2. This list grew through suggestions of project partners and terms used in literature, and led after a process of evaluation and discussion to a selection of 33 concepts in total.

Draft versions of the D3.2 vocabulary initially containing proposed terms from various facets were sent several times to all project partners for discussion and review, starting in July 2012 when the first version had been presented during the first MINT training in Athens. The decision of the project to include into the terminology work additional components for material and techniques, alongside with updating them upon request in order to cover the partners’ choice of objects in the best possible way, turned out to be particularly relevant for the work on the specialist Art Nouveau terminology: Several of the proposed specialist terms obviously apply for materials and techniques , and were integrated into these components in order to provide the terms within their appropriate facet and ensure consistent use in the metadata elements for material and techniques. Subsequently revised according to the partners’ commenting, the D3.2 vocabulary turned out to focus on Art Nouveau Style concepts. The partners proposed new terms, rejected terms and commented on the proposed terms. However, the decision to restrict the D3.2 vocabulary to the Art Nouveau style concepts has

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not been taken until the last call for a final feedback was sent out in January 2013. This latest draft version consisted of two parts encompassing Art Nouveau Styles concepts with their English preferred labels on one hand and candidate terms (examples) for further possible Art Nouveau specific terms on the other hand.

The first part of the draft was based upon the list of Art Nouveau style concepts brought together during the first period of terminology development. Several concepts were being added to this list based upon study of literature and further suggestions from the Partage Plus partners. The partners also provided scope notes for the concepts they had added. The list was being revised by the Partage Plus project partners with the aim of distinguishing between terms applicable for the indexing of Art Nouveau objects and terms to be rejected.

The second part of the Draft D3.2 took a final effort in trying to figure out further Art Nouveau specialist terms which might be important beyond the terms focussing on style specification. Examples taken from the Physical Attributes Facet of the AAT which might possibly be used for the description of Art Nouveau objects (like e.g. anthropomorphic, therianthropic, zoomorphic, baluster-shaped, curvilinear (shape), serpentine (shape), undulating (shape), whiplash curves) were taken into account, together with further proposed terms concerning the object type, like e.g. verreries parlantes, flower goblet, tulip vase, Jack-in-the-Pulpit vase and gooseneck vessels and the AAT concept "gooseneck lamps".⁶ However, the project partners rejected this kind of terms arguing that the scope of these terms would not allow for precise attribution and that they would not use these terms for the description of Art Nouveau objects. Moreover, it was not considered useful to compile concepts from all different facets into one component which could not be applied consistently to a specific metadata element, but rather tend to result in inconsistent and scattered information across several metadata elements with no use for retrieval purposes.

The final version of the D3.2 SPECIALIST ART NOUVEAU TERMS ‘MICRO’ VOCABULARY limited to concepts for style classification is the result of the Partage Plus partners’ participation in a long process of examination and discussion of the value and usefulness of the respective terms. The candidate concepts for indexing Partage Plus content with regard to style specification split into two groups only one of which has proved to be convenient for indexing for the partners.

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Several concepts have been rejected by the partners because of being pejorative or kind of nicknames. In order to document the process they are included in this deliverable as annex. The spectrum of various, sometimes rather helpless attempts of labelling mirrors the difficulty to coin words which could describe what people saw or which could trace the common aspect within the immense variety of aesthetic ambition. At the same time it indicates vivid public interest and need for polarizing communication when finally 'Art Nouveau' and 'Jugendstil' became widely accepted.

A representation of the full hierarchical structure including approved and deprecated concepts can be found in annex I.

UNIMAR presented the final version of the SPECIALIST ART NOUVEAU TERMS 'MICRO' VOCABULARY D3.2 during the 2nd PMB meeting (London, 27-28/02/2013 (M12)) where it was signed off. The scope notes were integrated to the vocabulary in English as well as the mapping relations to the AAT. The vocabulary work for Partage Plus and translation

requirements in particular have been discussed during the 2nd All Consortium Meeting in Aveiro (26.27/06/2013), followed by a call for amendment of translations. All partners translated the terminology into their languages by 24/09/2013 for integration by UNIMAR. Many project partners adapted the original spelling of the Art Nouveau style specific terms, translating only the qualifiers of homographs. The D3.2 Vocabulary is published for free reuse on the Partage Plus website.

2.4 Structure of the deliverable

The Deliverable D3.2 contains three different formattings of the Specialist Art Nouveau Terms Micro Vocabulary, all generated from the xTree tool used for managing the Partage Plus vocabularies:

- 1) List of concepts in hierarchical structure

- 3) Spreadsheet for facilitating its use for partners without SKOS support in their collection management system.

The style differs from Belgian and French Art Nouveau by a more restrained use of decoration. Jugendstil replaced the exuberance and naturalism of other Art Nouveau styles with a comparatively subdued aesthetic that was often almost unrecognizably, or not at all derived from nature.

The curators of the MAK agreed upon the recommendation not to use this concept for indexing Art Nouveau object descriptions. The concept "Secessionsstil" is not appropriate for use in scientific context as there is no authoritative definition for the scope of this term.

It contains 33 concepts for specifying different flavours or associated concepts of Art Nouveau in order to subclassify the wide range of Art Nouveau objects into their national, regional or other specific variations.

Providing a basic vocabulary for the enrichment of Art Nouveau content, the Partage Plus vocabulary is supposed to achieve also interest beyond the context of Partage Plus. Together with the vocabulary components of D3.1 and D3.3 the D3.2 Multilingual List of Specialist Art Nouveau Terms will facilitate access to the Partage Plus Art Nouveau content within Europeana. Published on the Partage Plus project website, the project vocabulary is a basic tool for being reused by other collections and projects aiming at integrating Art Nouveau related content with other resources. Descriptions of Art Nouveau objects already provided to Europeana may be enriched with the vocabulary as well in order to track and retrieve a much larger amount of Art Nouveau related objects which cannot be found at present in the context of Art Nouveau due to lack of consistent terminology. Also, museum professionals aiming at revising their collections' documentation may benefit from the effort of the Partage Plus project partners bringing together their cataloguing and indexing expertise. The indexing of heterogeneous metadata using the Partage Plus vocabulary will support amended retrieval functionality in Europeana, and faceted access will be enabled through the Partage Plus website, thereby inviting users to get into Art Nouveau content.

The results of all partners' contribution to the development of the Partage Plus D3.2 Multilingual List of Specialist Art Nouveau Terms appropriate for the indexing of Art Nouveau content with regard to national, regional or specific artists' related variations will be communicated to the Getty and offered for enrichment and modification of the respective AAT concepts, including argumentation for concepts being rejected.
