



Join the Europeana Teacher Community

Bring digital cultural heritage into the classroom, enrich students' educational experiences

The Europeana Education initiative aims to mainstream the use of digital culture in the classrooms, across curricula and at a transnational level. Europeana Foundation (EF) and European Schoolnet (EUN) have been working together for the last five years in making that happen, working closely with teachers from across Europe.

The Europeana Teacher Community 2019-2020

In the 2019-2020 academic year, over 2,000 teachers from 37 countries, teaching in primary and secondary schools, have been involved in creating learning scenarios and using them in classes, sharing their experiences on the *Teaching with Europeana* blog, following the Europeana Massive Open Online Courses (MOOC) and participating in the Europeana Education Competition.



Europeana **Teacher Community**

In this school year, we engaged with more than 2,000 teachers from across Europe. Thirteen of them (from ES, FI, FR, GR, HR, HU, IT, MT, PL, PT, RO, TR, and the European Schools) represent the Europeana Teacher Ambassador network. They coordinate the Europeana Education User Group, consisting of 134 teachers. Together, they contribute to the animation of the Europeana Classroom launched in March 2020, where you can find the learning scenarios, MOOCs, webinars and videos they have produced.



Europeana Massive Open Online Courses

During the second year of the project, the English and translated versions of the Europeana MOOC have attracted more than 3,600 registrants. A rerun version of the English, Spanish and Portuguese MOOCs ran in January and March 2020. The course was also translated to French and Italian and ran in March 2020. Participants from 37 countries joined these MOOCs. At the end of the courses, 668 teachers graduated successfully and received their certification.



Teaching with Europeana blog

In one year, the Teaching with Europeana blog has become an unmissable platform for teachers searching for new ideas and resources on how to use digital cultural heritage in their classrooms, but also to give and receive feedback about their learning materials. With an average of 11,000 monthly visits, the blog already counts more than 600 learning scenarios and stories of implementation. Since the second year of the project, resources are also available in 5 different languages.



Europeana **Educational videos**

In the second year of the project, aware of the higher demand for concise educational material, EF and EUN have decided to produce a series of 9 short educational videos in which the Europeana Ambassadors introduced different teaching methods or tools, and explained how to connect them to Europeana content. 






2020-2021: Strengthen the links between formal and informal education

Supporting the development and running of a new EuropeanaMOOC for formal and informal education.

Publish a book with the best examples of learning scenarios for formal and informal education with digital cultural heritage.
